

Car Pools Get 90% of Space on Federal Land As Energy Conservation Stressed by President

The center of activity at DMAAC the last two weeks has been the car pool registration areas at 2nd Street and South Annex as employees rushed to fill out new registration forms in compliance with new on base parking criteria.

The new criteria resulted from implementation of President Nixon's memorandum for Energy Conservation by the Federal Government. The Secretary of Defense and the Director of DMA issued instructions to implement the memorandum which directs that not less than 90% of the parking spaces on all DMA controlled property will be allocated to car pools of two or more employees.

The instructions further state that not more than 10% of available spaces will be allocated to executives, the handicapped and those working unusual hours.

DMAAC is not the only installation affected by the 90/10 rule. All Federally owned, leased or managed land in the United States is subject to the President's memorandum. Other installations in the Greater St. Louis area have also begun implementation as directives reach them through their respective chains of command.

At DMAAC the new on base parking program, which became effective yesterday, is part of the

Center's Phase II Energy Conservation Program.

Three types of bumper decals (A, B, and C) have been issued which identify the type of parking space available to the vehicle.

An "A" decal provides admittance and parking in reserved parking spaces for the director, deputy director, technical director, directorates, staff agency chiefs, department chiefs, tenant commanders and personnel in the grades of GS-14/0-5 and above. The physically handicapped as certified by the DMAAC medical officer and to personnel designated by the director as required to work

unusual hours (not 2nd or 3rd shift). Personnel in this category are authorized to enter the installation as single occupant of a vehicle.

The type "B" decal is for car pools and is the most prevalent decal on the installation. Personnel registered as legitimate two person or more car pools have been issued the "B" decal for each vehicle in the car pool and one reserved parking assignment card which authorizes the car to park on the installation in reserved parking spaces. The permit is to be used by the car pool driver of the day and must be displayed to the guard on entering the installation and placed on the dash board when the vehicle is parked. It is the responsibility of the car pool members to assure that the driver of the day has the permit in his or her possession. To facilitate the free flow of traffic into the installation drivers are asked to have the card ready to show the guard upon entrance. If you are a member of a car pool but must ride alone occasionally because of personal appointments, leave, etc., the "B" sticker on your bumper will allow you to park in K-lot at 2nd Street on a first come first served basis. At South Annex you may park in the designated area between Buildings 2 and 4, the north-south roadway and the authorized visitor parking area.

Car pools do not have to be made up strictly of DMAAC employees. Other government agency, contractor and private sector

members may be used in the car pool consideration so long as at least one person in the carpool is employed on the installation. These types of car pools must also be registered to include names, place of employment and office phone of all members.

The third type of sticker, the "C" is for personnel having genuine hardship in joining a car pool and must drive to work alone. Applications for this type of decal must be made in writing through the proper directorate, department or staff agency to SOC. The applications will then be certified by the transportation subcommittee of the DMAAC Energy Conservation Committee. The approved cases will park in "L" lot at 2nd Street and in any authorized parking space not prohibited by regulation at South Annex.

If you work on the 2nd or 3rd shifts you are encouraged to car pool too, however, you will be allowed to park on K lot in single occupancy vehicles without special bumper decals. If you should return to work during the first shift your parking will be subject to the day shift decal system.

Cars without A, B, or C type bumper decals will not be allowed to park on the installation during day shift operations.

Individual cooperation and patience is solicited during the early periods of the program in an effort to make the long-term required program workable.


His topic will be "Some Important Elements in the New Remote Sensing Panorama."

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Vice President Ford Praises Civil Servants

Vice President Gerald R. Ford praised employees of the Civil Service Commission during its recent observance of its 91st anniversary.

As featured speaker at the event which was held in Washington, the Vice President said, "I am convinced that one of the best ideas the people of America have ever expressed, and one of the best acts ever to come out of the Congress, was the creation of a career civil service back in 1883.

"I believe a strong career service is one of the greatest strengths of our democratic process, and one of the best guarantees of sound, effective, and efficient Government—even more so in 1974 than in 1883.

"It is unfortunate that the term 'civil service' often conjures up the very opposite of what I am talking about, for in this enlightened world there are some who still equate civil service with security and routine.

"To me, civil service has a much higher meaning.

"It is a work environment for which top-notch people are selected on the basis of ability. A place where the product of one's hands is more important than the color of one's hands. A place where the work itself takes precedence over the sex of the person doing it. A place where service to the people transcends party labels. A place where the word 'service' means exactly what it says.

"To me, civil service means tremendous knowledge and a great depth of understanding on the part of career people who have devoted their lives to Government. You can take almost any type of legislation that comes before the Congress, and I can give you an example of how the knowledge of career people has provided information that made a given bill an even better law.

"I am particularly aware of the achievements of the Commission during the last five years in the

Phase II In View

Phase II of the Effectiveness/Productivity display has been mounted on the walls in the first floor hallway in building 36. These twelve panels colorfully and graphically explain E/P from the initial motivation for the program and setting of preliminary objectives through the plans for achieving those goals. Each viewer can come away with not only a feeling of pride in past accomplishments but, as well as understanding of what E/P hopes to accomplish and how each one of us can help in achieving these E/P goals.

For those members of DMAAC who will not be able to view the exhibit in St. Louis, its basic plan can be described in three steps. The initial panel showing the E/P symbol and slogan—"Working Better Together"—is meant as a skeletal introduction to the E/P program. Its short narrative, "A plan for the DMAAC team to increase output 10% by FY 73" is essentially the goal of E/P. The program's distinguishing feature is that continued growth over the coming three years will be generated by the E/P savings and subsequent reapplication of these savings rather than from an increased budget. In effect our static

budget will be supplemented by our efforts to use present funds more prudently. Such an ambitious plan requires the creative cooperation of everyone.

The next section of the display describes DMAAC as it is at present: programs we support, products, and budget figures. The two panels with awards, citations and letters of appreciation emphasize the accomplishments made by this center in the recent past. In effect these five panels give the viewer an idea of where DMAAC stands at the starting point of the E/P program. It is important that we not only maintain our present status as a highly respected charting center but also that we continue to keep pace with new developments. To do all this without an increase in budget will require a continuation and amplification of our tradition of improvement.

The final section of the exhibit includes the last six panels. It describes more specifically how each employee can keep DMAAC a leader in the MC&G field; this is primarily through creativity and advancement of ideas, consistently intensive work, and continual acceptance and responsiveness to the

Gift of Life Program Available at Center

The Federal Executive Board of St. Louis in cooperation with the Kidney Foundation of Eastern Missouri and Metro East is sponsoring a Gift of Life Crusade, according to Roy Schuttenhelm, DMAAC project officer.

The crusade is to acquaint employees with the needs and services of the Kidney Foundation and to encourage employees and their families to join as volunteers in an organ donor program which includes, but is not limited to kidneys.

In addition to its work in the area of kidney disease, the Kidney Foundation also helps foster the support of citizens in donating vital organs which can be taken and used after their death to extend life and usefulness of people afflicted with a variety of serious conditions.

In order for each DMAAC employee to have the opportunity to join the crusade, key workers have been designated in each department, directorate or staff agency to explain and distribute information on the crusade and organ donations, and to answer

any questions about the program.

When a person joins in the organ donor program he completes and has witnessed an organ donor card known as a "pocket will". This card specifies those organs to be donated, and any special limitations. It is important, of course, to carry the card once it is completed. No other registration is required. While the program is being sponsored by the Kidney Foundation, it is desired that other organs, particularly eyes, be donated. The option of donating the entire body for anatomical study is possible.

While kidney transplants are not well publicized, it is an active and vital program. As of now 6500 successful kidney transplants have been made. Last year alone there were 2000 with 49 of those in St. Louis. If a transplant is rejected by a patient's body, additional transplants can be made until one is accepted. The success rate for transplants nationwide is 65%, in St. Louis about 70% and at St. Louis Children's Hospital it's about 80%. Over 200 people are now awaiting transplants in St. Louis.

Charting Pioneer Dies in Michigan

Col. Alfred H. Burton, a pioneer in aeronautical charting and the first editor of the *Orienter* died February 8th in Waterford, Michigan at the age of 96.

Colonel Burton from 1943 to 1946 was assigned as military chief of the Aeronautical Chart Plant's Production Section, a forerunner of DMAAC's Cartography Department and Printing and Distribution Department. After a brief retirement he returned to the plant in 1948 as a civilian with a dual assignment as Chief Library
