## New Wing Construction Approved by Congress

A \$24 million military construction project for the Aerospace Center was recently approved after congressional action on the FY'83 Military Construction Program.

The project is for a 150,000 square foot addition to Building 36 on the 2nd Street installation. The addition will be located within the "L" formed by the main building and the existing wing on the southern side.

The addition will be a four floor (with basement) brick structure

and will provide space for precision photogrammetric, photographic and cartographic equipment.

Management of the construction will be the responsibility of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Kansas City District. Construction is expected to begin in March 1983 and will be completed in 1985.

The new construction and additional hiring of personnel stems from increased charting program requirements during the past several years.

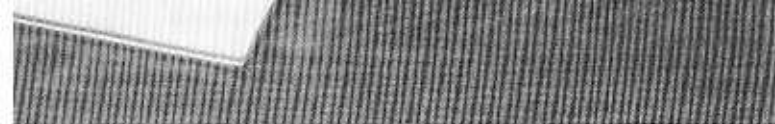

## CFC Campaign a Success

### Givers Give More But the Percentage Participating Declines

While the average gift to the Combined Federal Campaign of an Aerospace Center employee was up nearly \$5 in 1982, the percentage of the work force giving continued its seven-year decline. This year 67 percent of the work force in St. Louis contributed \$171,223.23 to the CFC; the total collected last year was \$172,421.27 with 72 percent of the work force contributing.

A goal of \$180,000 had been set for the 1982 campaign, and the total amount contributed was 95 percent of the goal.

CFC project officer Don Smith said he hoped that not reaching the goal would not "detract from the generosity of AC employees.

"We've always been a leader in this area. For example, TSARCOM has 4700 employees, compared to our 3581, and their goal this year was only \$120,000."

Individual gifts of AC employees ranged from 25 cents to \$832 (\$32

per pay period). The average gift was \$71.64—up \$4.85 from last year.

The Kansas City Office completed its CFC campaign with a total of \$9,690.18—82 percent of an

"A special thanks has to go to all the key workers. Their efforts are what generated the impressive total given by Aerospace Center employees and, more importantly, will provide help to people in need."



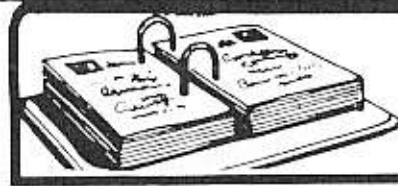

## Center Is Served by Six Bus Lines

With the increasing difficulty of finding parking at the main Aerospace Center facility on Second and Arsenal, employees may find it to their advantage to check out the services offered by the Bi-State bus system.

The Center is served by three commuter routes that originate in South County and three local routes that make connections to

Federal employees will pay the 1.3 percent hospital insurance tax on their annual earnings up to the maximum wage base that is covered by Social Security.

evening run that makes connections downtown originates at the Main Gate of the Aerospace Center (see picture).

The commuter routes that serve the Aerospace Center are the Tesson Ferry rapid, Oakville rapid, and Broadway-Barracks express. For all three commuter routes, passengers get off on Arsenal Street at the bus stop next to the Anheuser-Busch plant with the galloping Clydesdales on the wall, and get on near the I-55 south entry ramp on the other side of the I-55 overpass.

There are presently nine inbound runs of the Tesson Ferry rapid; the first bus leaves I-55 and Butler Hill Road at 6:07 a.m. and the last at 8:28 a.m. In the evening, buses stop at Arsenal and I-55 at 4:14 p.m. and continue until 6:26 p.m. The bus makes all stops after leaving I-55 at Bayless, including Union Road and Reavis Barracks Road, Union and Lindbergh, Tesson Ferry and Kempf, and I-55 and Butler Hill. From I-55 and Arsenal to I-55 and Butler Hill, the run is 35 to 40 minutes.

The Oakville rapid has three runs leaving New England Village at 6:29, 6:53 and 7:14 and arriving at I-55 and Arsenal at 7:05, 7:34 and 7:59. Other stops are Telegraph and Christopher, Telegraph and Pottle, Sylvan Springs Park-Ride Lot, Telegraph and Reavis Barracks, Reavis Barracks and Union, and I-55 and Loughborough. Outbound buses stop at I-55 and Arsenal at 4:56, 5:28 and 5:51.

**Employees making connections Downtown. Mantinband said taking the bus saves him money on car maintenance. A walk through Lyon Park to Broadway is necessary to board other Broadway buses.**

The Broadway-Barracks express has four runs leaving the Veterans Hospital in Jefferson Barracks at 6:22, 6:40, 6:52 and 7:22 and arriving at I-55 and Arsenal at 7:03, 7:21, 7:33 and 8:03. All local stops are made from the Veterans Hospital to Broadway and Koeln. Outbound buses stop at I-55 and Arsenal at 4:37, 5:05, 5:26 and 5:59.

The Broadway local passes Lyon Park 45 times daily on its route north to Downtown and along North Broadway to Riverview Drive and the Hall Street Garage. Connections with the Lafayette local can be made at Broadway and Lafayette, while connections to all parts of the metro area can be made Downtown. Continuing north, the Broadway local connects with the Grand local at Broadway and East Grand, the Vandeventer and Sarah locals at Broadway and Vandeventer, the Taylor and Jennings-South locals at Broadway and Taylor, and the Baden-Clayton, Hampton, and Spanish Lake locals at Broadway and Halls Ferry Road.



A single weekday run of the northbound Broadway local originates at the Main Gate of the Aerospace Center at 4:35 p.m. as a service to employees making connections Downtown. This run only goes as far north as Broadway and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive.

The Broadway local passes its Broadway and Arsenal stop going south 53 times daily on its route to the Catalan Loop at the city limits, 26 of these runs going as far as the Veterans Hospital in Jefferson Barracks. Connections can be made with the Chippewa local at Broadway and Chippewa, the Grand local at Broadway and Meramec, the McCausland-Delor local at Broadway and Mt. Pleasant, and the Hampton local at the Catalan Loop.

The Carondelet local, which stops across the I-55 overpass at 12th and Arsenal, travels south through the Cherokee Street shopping area and then south on California, Meramec, Virginia, Ivory, and Alabama. It continues through Lemay along Lemay Ferry Road and ends its run at the South County Shopping Center.

Hampton local at Alabama and Germania.

Traveling north from 12th and Arsenal, the Carondelet local connects at 12th and Chouteau with the Manchester, Manchester-Kirkwood, and Southampton locals.

The Arsenal local travels 19 times daily on a route that begins at Broadway and Wyoming, one block south of Arsenal, and follows Arsenal Street several blocks past Grand before turning south to the K-Mart Plaza on Gravois. The Arsenal line connects with four locals: the Cherokee at Arsenal and California, the Gravois at Arsenal and Gravois, and the Grand and Tower Grove locals at Arsenal and Grand.

Bi-State operates an information phone service from 6:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday. The Missouri number is 231-2345. Operators can answer questions and will also mail bus schedules to persons who request them.

The adult fare for local service is 75 cents at all times; a transfer to another local bus costs an additional 10 cents, while a transfer to a commuter (express or rapid) bus costs 25 cents. There are no "zone fares" in Missouri. The adult fare for commuter (express or rapid) service is \$1.00. Exact change is required for all fares.

1983 will count toward eligibility for hospital insurance in the same way that work covered by Social Security counts. A specified amount of earnings will equal one quarter of coverage. No more than four quarters of coverage can be earned in any one year. Federal employees who worked before January 1983 will be given credit for previous federal employment if they need it to qualify for hospital insurance.

Like other covered workers, federal employees may be eligible for hospital insurance at age 65, before age 65 if they are disabled, or at any age if they have permanent kidney failure. When a worker becomes entitled to hospital insurance at age 65, his or her spouse also will have hospital insurance protection at 65.

Hospital insurance covers inpatient hospital care, inpatient care in a skilled nursing facility, and home health care.

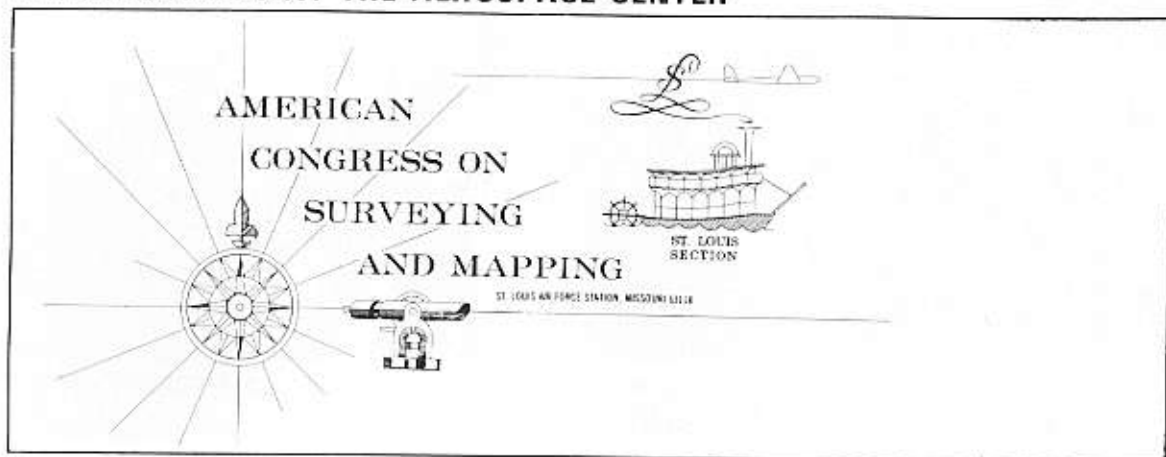

The St. Louis Section of the American Congress of Surveying and Mapping (ACSM) was founded in 1958 under the leadership of Frank Clemens. A pioneer in aeronautical charting, Clemens held key positions in the former Map and Chart Office of the Army Air Corps and Air Force Aeronautical Chart and Information Center.

During the last 24 years, the St. Louis Section has sponsored periodic technical meetings and hosted several national conventions. It has also sponsored awards at the St. Louis Science Fair for projects related to mapping, charting and geodesy.

Nationally, efforts to organize ACSM began in 1937, and the first national congress convened four years later in Washington, D.C.

The society continues to be an important force in furthering the goals of the profession at the national level. Through the Governmental Affairs Committee it sponsors along with the American Society of Photogrammetry, it presents to

## New Guide Lists Where To Get Vital Records

Persons who need help obtaining certified copies of birth, death, marriage or divorce records can get help from a new guide compiled by the National Center for Health Statistics.

The book, "Where to Write for Vital Records," is available from the Superintendent of Documents in Washington. It lists application offices, fees and other information to help members find records. The guide also tells how to obtain birth records for persons born in foreign countries who are U.S. citizens at birth and for alien children adopted by U.S. citizens. There is guidance on how to get certificates of citizenship, death records of Americans who died abroad, records of births and deaths occurring on vessels or aircraft on the high seas, and records kept by foreign countries.
