MS-DOS Contract Discontinued

The Federal Computer Corporation contract for 80386 microprocessors has been discontinued as a result of a contractual dispute. At this time, there is no DMA contract vehicle for the 80386 architecture, commonly referred to as MS-DOS.

For estimating purposes, both 1992 and out-year MS-DOS requirements should be identified to your local ADP coordinator who, in turn, should provide the information to Terry Harms (TSC/IMD, 703-285-9119) within the next month. Once your 1992 MS-DOS requirements are confirmed, the Technical Services Center and Acquisition will ensure that a contract vehicle is available to satisfy your office automation requirements.

The 68030 microprocessor contract (Macintosh), including peripheral equipment and major office automation software, is still valid. This contract with Falcon Microsystems Corporation calls for 30-day deliveries once the Central Contracts Office (DMA/AQAC) places an order. AQAC remains the only DMA contracting office authorized to place orders. The point of contact is Marcus Boyle (703-285-9344).

Robinson To Head Key Agency Program; Peeler to TSC Director

Robinson, who has over 20 years of experience with DMA, holds high qualification for his new role. He will draw upon his academic training in mathematics and photogrammetry and from his professional experiences in various key management roles

within the agency. He has served in the Systems and Techniques directorates at both component and headquarters level; has full knowledge of DMA products and production

from his years as DMA assistant deputy director of Programs, Production and Operations; and most recently exhibited his capabilities in his dual role as DMA deputy director for Information Systems and director of the Technical Services Center.

Replacing Robinson as DMA deputy director for Information Systems and the director of the Technical Services Center is Paul L. Peeler, Jr., technical director of the DMA Reston Center and also a member of the Senior Executive Service. Peeler has most recently been serving in a temporary capacity as the DMA Director's special assistant for Strategic Plan Implementation.

Peeler, who began his career in 1961 with the old Army Map Service, has held many key positions with DMA and its predecessor organizations. These positions have included chief of the Field Offices at DMAHTC, deputy director for Programs, Production and Operations and technical director at DMAAC, and technical director of the emerging Reston Center.

Operational Hardware and Software Problem?

Trouble Desk a Call Away

You're operating your FES workstation or mainframe computer, or typing a 1556 on a typewriter, or just becoming comfortable with your office automation equipment - - the screen goes blank, the print ball stops advancing, the diskette refuses to register. What do you do? Who do you call?

Support is provided to DMA personnel experiencing problems with hardware and software by means of the DMA Trouble Desk Service (TDS) managed and operated by DMASC and the DMATSC Help Desk.

The TDS was established to handle all remedial maintenance actions required for DMA production and mission support hardware and software. Personnel experiencing a problem with operational hardware or software should first verify that there is a

reportable problem by performing an initial evaluation. For example, procedures may have been overlooked or hardware may not be correctly configured or connected to a power source.

For office automation systems, DMATSC provides a Help Desk to assist with the initial evaluation of the problem. The TSC Help Desk was established to assist users who are encountering problems with office automation systems and to verify that a legitimate (hardware or software) problem exists.

For DMA employees in St. Louis, the TSC Help Desk telephone number is 4540. In Cheyenne, call 314-263-4540 or DSN 693-4540. The office is staffed from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Central Time, Monday through Friday.

Once it has been determined that there is a reportable problem, the

supervisor, system manager or other person designated by the using organization should then report the problem to the TDS. For DMA employees in St. Louis, the TDS phone number is 4751. In Cheyenne, call 1-800-852-8931. The Trouble Desk is staffed from 5:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Central Time, Monday through Friday.

A prerecorded message provides instructions on how to obtain service for both emergency and routine requests anytime the Trouble Desk is not staffed. Non-routine emergency calls received outside the staffed time frame will be processed the next business day.

(Note: Problems relating to the Mark 90 transition/activation are handled via the ACMS 4.5 Problem Reporting System and by procedures established for that activity.)

Hall Reassigned To Deputy Director, Plans & Requirements

Robert H. Hall has been reassigned to the DMA position of deputy director for Plans and Requirements, according to an announcement made by DMA Director Maj. Gen. William K. James, USAF.

Hall has been temporarily assigned to the position during the absence of incumbent Raymond Barrowman due to illness. Barrowman recently informed the Agency of his decision that he could not return to work.

Prior to coming to the Headquarters, Hall had been the deputy director for Programs, Production and Operations at the DMA Reston Center.

Defense Department To Get Unified Strategic Command

The United States is taking advantage of victory in the Cold War to change the way it commands strategic forces.

The United States Strategic Command, which will be activated June 1, 1992, will become the newest unified command in the Department of Defense and will be in charge of the strategic deterrent forces now commanded by the Air Force and Navy. The command will be based at Offutt AFB, Neb.

The changing world situation gave impetus to changes contemplated for many years. "The Cold War is over," said Brig. Gen. Robert E. Linhard, deputy chief of staff for plans and resources at Strategic Air Command. "Given that fact and the reduced levels of nuclear weapons, we want to be organized to contribute to the safety of the United States and reap the benefits of the end of the war."

The Strategic Command initially will be approximately 55 percent Air Force, 35 percent Navy and 10 percent Army and Marine Corps personnel. The command will use the strategic nuclear forces of the United States to deter war. These forces include the bombers and ICBMs of the

DMARC Disestablished; Consolidates under HTC

Major Gen. William K. James, USAF, Director of DMA, has announced his decision to disestablish the DMA Reston Center (RC) as a separate component and to consolidate its mission and functions under the DMA Hydrographic/Topographic Center (HTC).

The action will help streamline the DMA organization and permit reductions in management structure and administrative overhead, commented the Director in his announcement.

Reston Center production equipment will be left predominantly intact at the Reston facility. There will not be an attempt to redesign the

The action will help streamline DMA and permit reductions in management structure.

Digital Production System to a two-Center baseline prior to full operating capability in November 1992.

The decision to consolidate Reston Center under HTC was made after several months of study. In his letter to all personnel the Director explained, "Last July, in anticipation of significant resource reductions, I appointed a team to develop a DMA Strategic Plan to posture the Agency to provide the highest possible level of support to war fighters within severe budget constraints. The team was chartered 'to look at all possible courses of action unconstrained by the way we currently do business or by existing operating location and organization. One of the recommendations in the team's September 1991 report was for the merger of RC under HTC."

The Director indicated his decision was made after review of the team proposal and after consideration of additional information provided by the Director of RC.

Employees will be advised as further details of the consolidation are determined.

Strategic Air Command and the missile submarines of the Atlantic and Pacific fleets. Also included are strategic reconnaissance and command and control units and assets necessary for the strategic deterrent mission. As these forces are brought to strategic alert status, they would come under the direct control of Strategic Command.

Forces not on alert status, such as missile submarines not actually patrolling and bombers, are controlled by the services, and the services become force-provider units in case the assets are needed. This will work in much the way many commands provided combat-ready forces to U.S. Central Command during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

The Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff will form the nucleus around which the new command will form.

"PIAAR'em , " Please!

The people of the Defense Mapping Agency Aerospace Center are an innovative breed. Every day there are new success stories about accomplishing goals in the wake of unforeseen obstacles and about improving existing processes so that we can carry on the tradition of providing our armed forces with the needed maps, charts and digital data.

Increasing productivity through innovation is also necessary for DMAAC's future, as we face an uncertain world, increasing requirements and declining budgets. And it's these declining budgets that make it so important that we have a mechanism for "taking credit" for doing the right thing right. It's called Process Improvement After Action Reports, or PIARR's.

A PIAAR is the tool for reporting results of a process improvement action. The one-page form (DMA Form 5010.3 Nov. '91) is prepared by the organization, team or individual

most instrumental in effecting the change. It captures one-time savings, recurring savings (up to seven years) and implementation costs.

PIAAR's aren't a substitute for the Suggestion Program, but they are related. While a suggestion proposes savings, a PIAAR documents savings after the fact. There is no requirement for one to precede the other.

Fiscal Year 91 was the first year we used PIAAR's. In fact, most of the 38 PIAAR's from DMAAC were submitted during the final two months, August and September. We were credited with \$12,865,352 in savings, calculated over a seven-year period, FY's 91-97. That's an exceptional beginning, which reflects our continual striving to achieve higher levels of excellence.

Already in FY 92, six PIAAR's have been forwarded to the Headquarters for validation and approval. If validated as submitted, the combined life cycle saving will be close to \$15 million!

PIAAR's are important because they serve as a measure of progress and document our innovativeness. Let's build upon our success and make FY 92 an exceptional year for process improvements. And please take time to take credit; it's worth the effort.

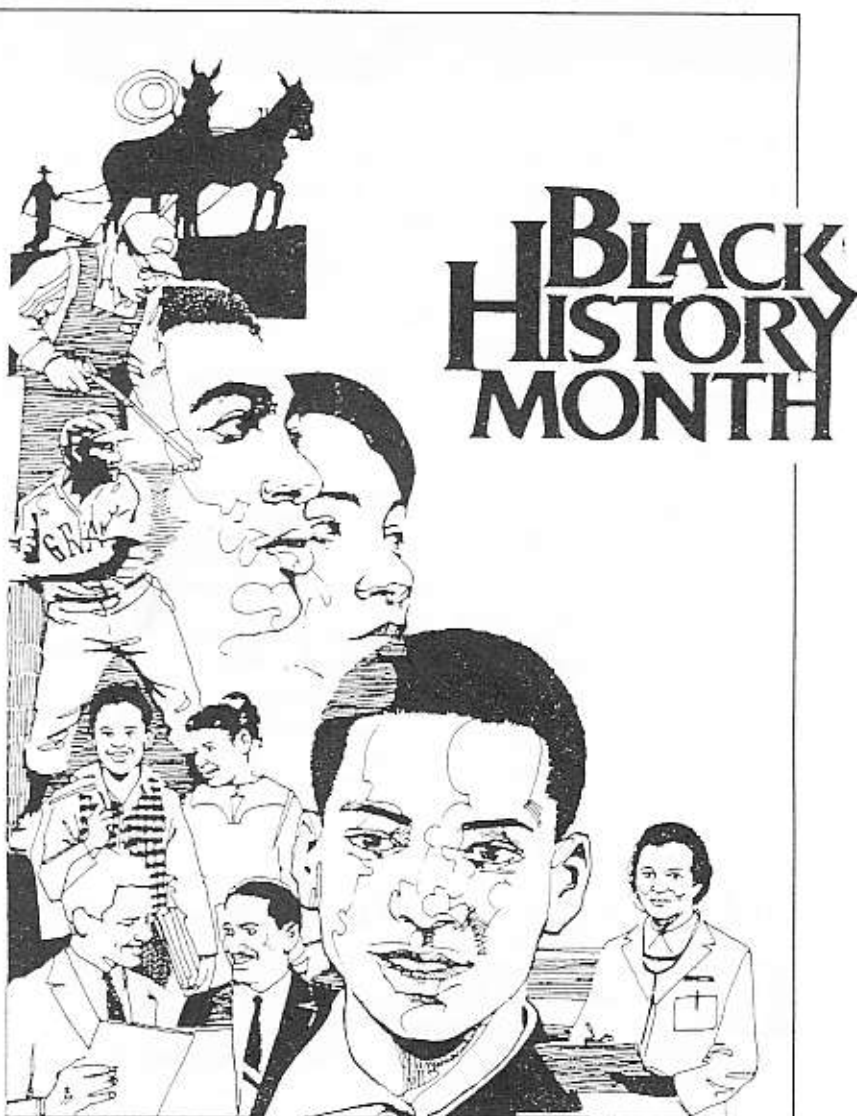
